

We have asked all the members to write about Alaska history as it pertains to philately for this publication many times. We thought maybe the reason we don't get much response is because the perfect topic was eluding you. So, we have compiled brief list of Alaska history in several parts (other parts will appear in subsequent issues) for you to look over and if something intrigues you, please do a bit a research and write a short piece for inclusion in the next TAP. We really need your assistance.

1958 – Statehood measure passes; President Eisenhower signs statehood bill.

1959 – Statehood proclaimed; state constitution in effect; Sitka pulp mill opens. U.S. Court of Claims issues judgement favoring Tlingit and Haida claims to Southeast Alaska lands.

1964 - Good Friday earthquake.

1966 – Alaska Federation of Natives organized. Interior Secretary Udall imposes a "land freeze" to protect Native use and occupancy of Alaska lands.

1967 – Fairbanks flood.

1968 – Oil pumped from a well at Prudhoe Bay on North Slope. Governor Hickel establishes Alaska Lands Claims Task Force that recommends a 40 million acre land settlement for Alaska Natives.

1969 – North Slope Oil lease sale brings \$900 million. First live satellite telecast in Alaska.

1971 - Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act signed into law.

1972 - Alaska Constitution amended to prohibit sexual discrimination.

1973 - Congress passes the Trans-Alaska Pipeline Authorization Act; salmon fisheries limited entry program becomes law.

1974 - Alaska voters fail to approve capital move initiative.

1975 - Alaska Legislature appropriates funds to initiate purchase and installation of 100 satellite earth stations for establishment of statewide satellite communications network.

I know it seems like I am always saying it, but it is a constant problem. We need original articles and other material for TAP. I have said it before and I will keep saying it. Everyone has an item that can tell a story and everyone can tell that story. Please take some time and write something for TAP. —Eric Knapp


New Sitka MOB Cancel

Just found my second Sitka MOB cancel used postally. The scans of both are attached (one for the front side of the postal cards, the other for the message side).

The cards, both UXC1's, were mailed the same day. I don't think they're genuine nonphilatelic usages, since, although they were clearly written on the same typewriter, are addressed to and signed by different people. The message on the card with the "via air mail" etiquette (label) actually refers to the sender of the other card (Dick). Also, the typing style is different—the double vs single-spacing, indenting vs block addresses, the paragraph indent on one, the date shown on the other.

My guess is that senders Dick and Fred (along with Hank) were working or living together, and shared an office or personal typewriter. For convenience sake, they




decided to write cards to their respective loved ones and mail them at the same time. Since the cards were sent in January---not exactly tourism season even in the relatively warm Southeast Alaska panhandle---my guess is they worked in either the fishing industry or for a government entity. Perhaps Dick and Fred were brothers, which might explain why both cards survived, somehow part of a family inheritance.

The messages on both cards are in interesting insight into a Sitka winter, as well as concerns for the folks back home.

This postal usage of the Sitka M.O.B. isn't listed in Postmarks of Territorial Alaska.

In the scans, the card on the top (with the etiquette) belongs to the message on the left.



Gold Nuggets

Starvation and Disease

Stampeders faced dozens of dangers along the trails into the Klondike. An avalanche in the spring of 1898 killed 63 people along the Chilkoot Pass trail. The previous September, heavy storms and a flood washed away much of the tent town set up at Sheep Camp, also on the Chilkoot Pass trail.

Certainly those who had survived the trails, the river, the White Horse Rapids , and made it all the way to the gold fields must have believed that they were now safe. Stampeders who spent the winter of 1897/1898 camped along the trails heard rumors from outgoing travelers of harsh conditions in Dawson, including talk of starvation.

In 1897, over 1,000 stampeders beat the bulk of the rush and reached Dawson before winter set in. Many of the new arrivals were inadequantely prepared and had not brought enough supplies with them to last through the spring. By September 30, 1897, when the last steamship of the season had unladed its cargo at Dawson, officials determined that unless some action was taken, there would not be food enough for everyone that winter.

Chevak Alaska Cancel Subject: Chevak cover

Bought a huge lot of postals on eBay—all return cards addressed to the Department of Health asking if the recipient wanted to stay on the mailing list for *Alaska's Health* magazine.

One of them stuck out, because it appears to be a straightline cancel that the Chevak postmaster apparently added in addition to Type 1. The card was sent from the Sercet [sic] Heart Mission.


This kind of straightline wasn't on any other of the 220 or so cards in the lot. Has anyone else seen this kind of straightline?

Reply from Bill Helbock

Hi Don,

Thanks for the image. I have seen similar handstamps used on registered mail once in a while from the 1950s. They were probably intended for use on parcel post mail. Too bad the pm used his 4-bar as well, if he had only used the straight-line, we'd be looking at a new postmark type.

By 1900, Nome would have looked very familiar to those who had rushed to the gold fields through Dyea or Skagway. The biggest difference was now in Nome, the now-familiar wild melee of thousands of stampeders sorting through and hauling their gear out of the surf was compounded by stampeders digging for gold all along the beach.

In the summer of 1900, Nome was the largest general delivery address in the U.S. postal system.

In his book, Alaska's First Free Mail Delivery in 1900, letter carrier Fred Lockley noted that the postal clerks had to use five filing boxes just to sort letters for people named "Johnson."

Whichever route they had chosen, few stampeders believed it was the easy one. Those arriving from the White Pass trail told horror stories of crossing over rotting animal carcasses in their struggle over the mountain. Those who had carried 2,000 pounds up the "Golden Stairs" argued that nothing could have been worse then their trek.

By the time they were ready to set sail down the Yukon River, the stampeders could all agree on one thing. Everyone was getting rich but them.

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
Registry Receipt from Caro

A registry receipt card with a Caro Alaska cancel from Nov 22, 1907 is shown below, both front and back sides.

Caro was a gold mining camp on the Chandalar River in Alaska's Brooks Range, north of the Arctic Circle. It had a post office from 1907-1912.

More interesting is the fact that the mining camp got it's name from the daughter of one of the more famous people in Alaska postal history. Caro was named after Caro Kingsland Clum, the daughter of John P. Clum, Alaska postal inspector during the Klondike gold rush, who was responsible for establishing scores of Alaska post offices, and was later postmaster at Fairbanks.

John Clum was famous for capturing Geronimo, was founder and editor of the Tombstone Epitaph, and was a friend of Wyatt Earp. A biography of John Clum is being written by a postal historian.

Candidate Statements

CANDIDATE FOR PRESIDENT

Jim Zuelow

I didn't realize it at the time, but I purchased the first item in my Alaska Postal History collection the first day I was in Anchorage in 1965 while visiting the Lamb's stamp store in the rear of the Book Cache. I was on my way to Chevak to serve as a Bureau of Indian Affairs teacher for a two year stint. That soon changed into a very challenging, exciting, and rewarding 25 year career! Were it not for arthritis, my wife and I would likely still be there.

I didn't find out about The Alaska Collectors' Club until after I retired and moved to Arizona and had more time to pursue my own interests. I discovered a TAP issue in the Postal History Museum, which is located in Tucson. I also collect other Alaskana, and have a reasonably good collection of Alaska books. I've made many new friends through the ACC and am willing to try to continue to serve as President.

CANDIDATE FOR VICE PRESIDENT Angela Watson

CANDIDATES FOR DIRECTOR Dirk van Gelderen

I was born in 1957 in Boskoop, Holland and have always lived there. I started collecting when I was 5 and from the beginning I collected USA stamps which I still do. In the early 1970's my father and I started collecting Bosnia and Herzegovina (nobody then knew where that was) and together we built one of the largest collections now in existence. In 1984 I visited Alaska and as a memento I mailed from all towns visited a card home.

Directly afterwards, but still not really seriously I wrote to all other postmasters asking for a postmark. One was sent in error to the late Ray Fay of Mansfield, OH and he got me really hooked on Alaska Postal History. Currently I am trying to complete my catalogue of Alaska Statehood Postmarks which will be available on CD ROM together with Richard Helbock's work on the Territorials. It is also available on-line at www.esveld.nl/alaska/alaska.htm for free.

Richard Wood

I've been asked to be an ACC Director candidate. Some ACC members are interested in broadening the scope of the club to include all the collecting fields of Alaskana, not just postal history. I assume that postal history would still be the main emphasis. I'm fine with that if that's what folks want (it wasn't my idea). I've collected things most of my life. I don't collect postal history, but I've been a dealer of

all things Alaska since 1982, including postal history.

Oddly, postal history was the very first thing I ever collected. When I was about 6, my parents made a trip to NYC. They returned with a present for me, an album with grid pages for cut-out postmarks. I enjoyed collecting postmarks for a while. Next came matchbook covers.

Later stamps, then coins. When I was a wildlife student at UAF I began collecting Alaska natural history books, then general Alaska books, then I found myself buying and selling Alaska books, then all of Alaskana. I intended to be a wildlife photographer, and did that for 5 years, but the thrill of the hunt for Alaskana pushed that to the back burner. From Fairbanks I'd make two-month buying trips to the northeast, one in the spring and one in the fall (the show seasons). I did that for many years. Everyone on the show circuit knew me and they called me "Mr. Alaska". Some would save great things for me. Oh, those halcyon days...

I also advertised heavily in about 50 different antiques newspapers. I bought & sold hundreds of thousands of Alaska things. I'm still at it. Of course eBay has changed everything. Most of the antiques newspapers are gone, and pickers don't need middlemen like me anymore. Today, I collect very early Alaska photography (my passion), especially stereoviews, magic lantern, and cartes de visite.

I also collect Alaska Native carved silver souvenir spoons, Alaska Native model watercraft, and early Alaska paintings. My expertise is Alaska books, ephemera (member of the Ephemera Society for over 20 years) and pre-1897

Gold Nugget

On April 3, 1898, a series of avalanches struck along the Chilkoot Pass trail. The worst, which hit that morning, killed dozens of stampeders. Civic promoters in Dyea feared that their counterparts in Skagway would use the tragedy to tout the White Pass as the safer trail. They did.

The first stampeders arrived in Skagway less than two weeks after the Portland had docked in Seattle. On July 29, 1897, when the mail steamer Queen landed these first anxious would-be millionaires on the beach, Skagway (then known as Skaguay; the spelling change was made later, possibly by the Post Office Department) was barely a collection of tents.

Dyea and Skagway's rivalry was brief, but heated. Even though the Chilkoot Pass (through Dyea) was the most popular trail, Skagway was always the larger town. In the first half of 1898, when Skagway was teeming with stampeders, it was the biggest town in Alaska.
