

I'm glad to report that 100% of the directors and officers are taking part (plus Auction Manager Terry Shaw & Anchorage Philatelic Society President Dave Schwantes)! So far, we have addressed the topics of the 2008 & 2009 ACC Sustaining Member Covers, and are now considering changes to the terms of office for the officers and directors. IF any changes are approved by the Board, they would go to the membership for a yea or nea vote in accord with our current Bylaws which are found on our website at www. A;askaPhilatelic.org (the current Catalog of Alaska Statehood Postmarks, 1959-1999 is found at www.alaskacollectorsclub. nl. If you would like to be included, just contact any member of the Board or myself. We need YOUR ideas!

Some current members of the ACC have contacted me recently expressing their interest in a census of early Alaska covers and cards from 1867 through 1899. Guess what? One of our contributing members and former officer, Bob McKain of Pennsylvania, began compiling such a census over 15 years ago. The results of his first efforts were published in The Alaska Philatelist in 1994-95. In his own words: "The list is rather self explanatory. It goes by town, the date of the cancel, the type as listed in Helbock's Postmarks of Territorial Alaska, the reference where the cover was last reported, is there an illustration in the reference, the price realized in auction --- if known ---, and the addressee or other pertinent data from the cover/card itself to identify the item."

Bob's research covers Afognak through Yakutat, plus US Post Office in Alaska, and the early RPO's. You can find the results of this census in past TAP issues as follows (my summary):

Part 1: Afognak - Dyea, TAP# 165, Vol 30, No. 1, pp 14-17

Part 2: Eagle - Kenai, TAP# 167, Vol 30, No. 3, pp 71-74.

Part 3: Ketchikan - Roberts, TAP# 169, Vol 30, No. 5, pp 127-130.

Part 4: St. Michael - Wells Fargo, TAP# 172, Vol 31, No.2, pp 41-45

Hopefully, Bob will be able to publish an updated version of his original census in a later edition of TAP. If you have a cover that might not be included in the earlier census, please contact him at 57vette@comcast.net.




Aunt Phil's Trunk, Volumes 1 – 3 By Phyllis Downing Carlson, Laurel Downing Bill

Starting with a weekly column in the "Anchorage Chronicle" from 2002 to 2004, Laurel Bill has been taking the research of her late aunt, historian Phyllis Downing Carlson, and turning them into a series of great articles on Alaska history. These original columns were expanded on and turned into the start of this book series. The result is a great series of books on the history of Alaska.

Three of a planned four volume series have now been published. Spanning time from Alaska's pre-history to 1935, these three volumes tell Alaska's history in a fun and informative manor. Well known and unknown events are well covered. The books are well illustrated with a large number of period photographs.

These books are a fun way to get an education on Alaska's history. They are great fun and they taught this long time Alaskan things he didn't know. Always a good result in a book about history.

A Pocketful of History: Four Hundred Years of America—One State Quarter at a Time By Jim Noles

As the 50 State Quarter program comes to an end it seems appropriate that a book should come out about it. Luckily the book is a good one. Jim Noles has written a book that informative without being dry and fun without being too fun (if that makes sense).

Starting with an introduction describing how the program began. The idea came from Canada's Provincial quarters issued during the Canada 125 celebrations. It then gives a description of every coin and what it depicts, from Caesar Rodney (whom I had never heard of) on the Delaware quarter to King Kamehameha I on the Hawaii quarter.


Noles then tells a story about each coin and how it relates. He takes the three quarters that depict bison to tell the story of the bison, their near destruction and their comeback.

He is not shy about talking about the designs he likes, the ones he doesn't like and the ones he just doesn't understand. He also briefly discusses the decision making process that each state took in creating the designs. He also lists the number of coins minted for each quarter for the coins completed up to the time the manuscript was typeset for the book. So far, the Virginia quarter had the largest mint run.

For the Alaska quarter, which depicts a brown bear, he talked with a man who was mauled by one. The man's final comment was that "the bear was being a bear."

I did find a couple of minor errors, but then every book has these and I suspect the will be fixed in future printings.

This is a fun book about the 50 State Quarters. A program which I admit has gotten me started collecting coins again, although not nearly as heavily as I collect stamps.



Arctic Air Mercy Flight Label Mystery Revisited

The website The Philatelic Database (www.philatelic-database.com) has a short article by William Cochrane.

The article discusses many of the points we have discussed in these pages as to where and when the labels were created.

The interesting thing that Mr. Cochrane points out is a possible source for the vignette. He notes that the artwork for the Arctic Air Mercy Flights labels (figure 1) is very similar to a series of stamps issued by Norway to



help fund a flight to the North Pole by Roald Amundsen (figure 2).

The Norway stamps, Scott #104-110, show a polar bear and airplane is a very similar format to the Arctic Air labels. He speculates that the Norway stamps inspired the design of the Arctic Air labels.

The question is still open as to who made the labels and why.

The known postmark dates range only from May 27 thru August 2, 1967. Duck Stamp Error Proves Embarrassing

WRONG PHONE NUMBER SENDS CALLER TO SEX LINE

WASHINGTON - People calling a federal phone number to order duck stamps are instead greeted by a phone-sex line, due to a printing error the government says would be too expensive to correct.

The carrier card for the duck stamp transposes two numbers, so instead of listing 1-800-782-6724, it lists 1-800-872-6724. The first number spells out 1-800-STAMP24, while the second number spells out 1-800-TRAMP24.

People calling that second number are welcomed by "Intimate Connections" and enticed by a husky female voice to "talk only to the girls that turn you on," for \$1.99 a minute.

Duck stamps, which cost \$15 a piece, are required to hunt migratory waterfowl. The government uses nearly all the revenue to purchase waterfowl habitat for the National Wildlife Refuge System. In 2006-2007, the latest figures available, duck stamp purchases brought in nearly \$22 million.

This year's stamps, which feature a pair of northern pintail ducks, went on sale July 1 and are good through June 30 of next year. The error will not be corrected until next year's duck stamps.

The Fish and Wildlife Service, which administers the program, printed about 3.5 million duck stamps attached to cards with the wrong number. An agency spokeswoman, Rachel Levin, said it would cost \$300,000 to reprint them.

"I don't know that it would be worth it to do a reprint," she said Thursday. "That's a lot of money we can be using for wildlife conservation. With all of the needs for conservation, it doesn't make sense to divert money away from an important cause." For those people who like to dial by letter, the card does include the proper 1-800-STAMP24.

"As best we know, it was a typographical error that was not caught," Levin said, stressing that the stamps are still valid.


The agency first learned of the mistake a few days ago, when a duck stamp owner informed them about the glitch. Levin said the agency has not received any complaints.


The error, which was first reported Wednesday by Denver TV station KUSA, is limited to self-adhesive versions of the stamps. The moistened version, which is printed in much smaller numbers, does not come with a carrier card.

The government uses a contractor, Ashton Potter Security Printers of Williamsville, N.Y., to print the duck stamps. Levin said she did not know whether the error was made by the government or by the company.

Ashton Potter's president and chief executive, Barry Switzer, said that the company was provided with the wrong telephone number.

"We reproduced the wrong number correctly," he said. "We regret this whole situation happened, but we did our job properly."





St. Terese, a Shrine AND a Post Office

Just north of Juneau is a Roman Catholic shrine dedicated to Saint Terese.

Saint Terese was born in France in 1873. She became a Carmelite nun at age 15 after appealing directly to the Pope to be allowed to join. She was considered underage.

Despite her desire for the dramatic and expansive, Therese developed a simple spirituality, based on childlike trust and confidence in God. The spirituality of her "little way" was not about extraordinary things - but rather about doing simple things of life well and with extraordinary love.

She died at 24 of tuberculosis. She was canonized in 1924. According to Donald Orth's Dictionary of Alaska Placenames, the shrine was completed in 1933 and named for Theres de Lisieux (1873-97). USPO records show that Rev. William Vasseur was appointed postmaster on June 11, 1938. The appointment of Rev. E.A. McNamara was made October 4, 1945, but rescinded January 14, 1946. William McIntyre, St. Theres' last postmaster served from January 14, 1946 until the office was closed on August 5 that same year.

For a short time the shrine had its own post office. The office was inaugurated on July 20 1938, by Postmaster General James A Farley. The post office was discontinued in 1946. The shrine and the old post office building still exist to this day.

The church issued a first day of post office cachet for the shrine. It is shown here as figure 1. This particular copy is signed by the Postmaster.

This fund raising letter was included in some of the covers. The full letter is shown in figure 2. This copy of the letter came from Steve Sims.

This is the text of the fund raising letter (actual scan of letter on following page):

HERE'S GOOD NEWS TO YOU AND FOR YOU

Twenty-three miles from Juneau, Alaska, on the shores of Lynn Canal, there is being built a retreat house and Shrine, to be dedicated as a permanent memorial to His Excellency, Most Reverend J. R. Crimont, S. J. D. D., our beloved Bishop of Alaska, who has so unselfishly devoted forty-five years of his life to the work of the Church and the people of Alaska.


The retreat house when finished will contain ten living rooms, a chapel, social hall and kitchen. Accommodations will be available to anyone, irrespective of color, creed or race, and in fact at the service of all seeking the consolation of a retreat under experienced spiritual directors.

The chapel will be built of high grade stone, quarried adjacent to our property, and will be used besides a place of worship as a repository for a number of beautiful paintings which have been presented as gifts to the Shrine. These paintings are to be placed in the chapel as soon as it is finished. From Ireland we have received a beautiful set of vestments and other religious articles for the chapel.

We have been encouraged in our good work by the favors granted to those who contributed towards the building of the Shrine in honor of The Little Flower.

You can assist in the building of the Shrine by purchasing a stone to be placed in the Shrine building. Stones are sold from one dollar to five dollars each. Anyone donating one hundred dollars or more will have his name inscribed on the plaque to be placed in the Shrine with a perpetual remembrance at the Shrine in the holy sacrifice of the Mass.



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
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

Special Cover for Joe Redington, Sr.


Joe Redington Sr. is known as the "FATHER OF THE IDITAROD". When he told people of his goal to run a sled dog race Anchorage to Nome, they thought he was crazy. However, in 1973 the first race was run. Joe didn't enter that race. He wanted to, but he had promised a \$50,000 purse, and he hadn't raised it, so he dropped out to continue to raise the money. He eventually mortgaged his own home to get the money.

He completed fifteen Iditarod races, and although he never won the race, he did finish as high as fifth two times. He hadn't run the race for a number of years before 1997, but decided to enter the 25th anniversary of the event. It was to be his last Iditarod. He developed cancer and passed away just two years later.

Joe became internationally famous for his Iditarod involvement, and aided many entrants from foreign coun-

tries in their first Iditarod competitions by teaching them the sport and supplying dogs for them. Joe had complete faith in the savvy and power of the Alaskan huskies. He even led the first dog-team expedition to the summit of 20,320-foot Mt. McKinley in 1979.

This special cover was made just for Joe. The large 25 represents the 25th running of the Iditarod Race. The 50 represents fifty years of mushing for Joe, and the 80 represents his age at that time. He carried just 50 of these covers over the trail, and signed each of them. I was lucky enough to be at the finish line on March 15th when he crossed to the cheering of hundreds of fans. Joe's name will forever be linked to this great race. He passed away on June 24, 1999, and this past February was inducted into the Alaska Sports Hall of Fame.

Email Request Yields Historical Perspective

Editor's Note: In response to an email request from our club president, Bob McKain writes of how his personal history intersescts with that of the ACC.

First, I want to thank you for the listing of Alaska Highway Construction Camps, the Brief History of the Alaska Highway, and listing of US units Engaged on the Alaska Highway Construction; these were great TAP articles & a significant contribution to the ACC!

ACC Director Dick Wood, Juneau, has expressed an interest in a census of pre-1900 Alaska covers. I know you published one in the TAP in 1995 or thereabouts. I don't know if you have this in a database that could be emailed, but Dick is interested. Eric Knapp has told us he has about completed his index of all past TAP issues. I think he plans to sell a CD version, most likely through the ACC (the details are not yet worked out). Have you been able to update the cover census?

Again, thanks for your many contributions to Alaska philately --- and I'll look forward to more in the future!

PS: Would you consider writing an article about how and when you became involved with Alaskan Postal History?

Dear Jim,

Thanks so much for your kind words. History fascinates me and sometimes I go overboard when researching and as you know what floats one persons boat doesn't do much for the other person's. The most frustrating thing that most writers note is that once you put everything down and eagerly wait for additions and responses from the readers nothing happens. Anyhow to move on. I have the Alaska pre-1900 cover synopsis on a floppy disk somewhere around the house. I updated it briefly after the series of articles but the formatting is probably shot by now. I think I used word. I'd be happy to pass it on or make a copy of what I have if someone wants info for research. Much of the additional data came from old time ACC members who are no longer with us. Seely Hall and George Hall were big time contributors along with many auction catalogs that I received

(when they were free). Right now I'm very interested in the Alaska Highway construction and cove rs from the military (1942-43) and civilian contractors.

Now - the personal side. I used to work for a large corporation headquartered in Pittsburgh that moved us from Pittsburgh to Raleigh to Seattle to San Francisco and then back to Pittsburgh in 1978 and they were bought out in 1986. It was when we lived on the west coast from 1973-78 that I got to Alaska twice and became fascinated with its postal history. I think I joined the club in 1976. About that time I also met Bill Helbock and still remain friendly with he and Cath to this day. We had both joined the ACC and I think Bill published the bulletin under his house name "Raven Press". We became officers in the club and about that time there were many problems with the current club membership i.e., poor delivery of TAP, missing funds, missing library items, lack of communication, etc. Bill and I were heavily into Alaska postal history at the time, so he proceeded to continue publishing TAP at a loss and we both contributed long articles to fill it up while begging current members to please send money and we would try to keep it going. Several old and original members also pitched in. We figured if the club died, it would be hard to resurrect.

I sold my Alaska collection thru Frajola years ago but the postal history of the State continued to fascinate me. I still have a voluminous collection of Branches and Stations although not updated for several years. I also have pretty large collections of Alaska and Western Canada APO's from WWII and was fortunate to have edited the Alaska section of Helbock's recent book of WWII censor markings. This got me started on the Alaska Highway research.

Well I guess I've rambled enough - you can use what you want in TAP but probably not advisable to air out the club's dirty laundry in TAP - there may still be some old wounds out there. I know I've had a few accusations made against me by those who did not know what was going on.

I am a professional engineer and am 64 years old. I grew up in Virginia Beach, VA and went thru school in that state. Having lived in Pittsburgh for 30 years now I consider myself a died in the wool Pittsburgh Steelers fan! I collect all postal history involved with Pittsburgh and its mail environs and have an extensive collection of all of the machine type cancels used in the City from 1872-1930.
